OIG FINAL REPORT: CLIA REGULATION OF UNESTABLISHED LABORATORY TESTS

On July 1, 2001, the Office of the Inspector General (OIG) released the final report entitled "CLIA Regulation of Unestablished Laboratory Tests." This report examined the regulation of unestablished laboratory tests--i.e., tests that are not generally accepted by those involved in traditional laboratory practice and oversight. An example of such a test is "live blood cell analysis." The OIG found that this test has not been able to meet requirements of the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments of 1988 (CLIA).
