### What is COVID-19?

COVID-19 is caused by the SARS-CoV-2 virus which a new virus in humans causing a contagious respirat illness. ## What is the Visby Medical COVID-19?

The test is designed to detect the virus that causes COVID-19 in respiratory specimens, for example nasal swabs.

### Why was my sample tested?

You were tested because your healthcare provider believes you may have been exposed to the virus that causes COVID-19 bases only ur signs and symptoms (e.g., fever, cough, desculty breaking), and/or because:

- You live in a have ecently traveled to a place where transmission COVID 19 is known to occur, and/or
- You have bear in close contact with an individual aspectation or confined to have COVID-19.

# When are the known and potential risks and benefits fithe st?

ential risks include:

- Possible discomfort or other complications that can happen during sample collection.
- Possible incorrect test result (see below for more information).

## Potential benefits include:

- The results, along with other information, can help your healthcare provider make informed recommendations about your care.
- The results of this test may help limit the spread of COVID-19 to your family and those you come in contact with.

What does it mean if I have a positive test result? If you have a positive test result, it is very likely that you have COVID-19. Therefore, it is also likely that you may

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be placed in isolation to avoid spreading the virus to others. You should follow CDC guidance to reduce the potential transmission of disease.

There is a smaller possibility that this test can give a positive result that is wrong (a false positive result) particularly when used in a population without many cases of COVID-19 infection. Your healthcare provider will work with you to determine how best to care for you based on the test results along with medical history, and your symptoms

What does it mean if I have a negative test result? A negative test result means that the virus that causes COVID-19 was not found in your sample.

However, it is possible for this test to give a negative result that is incorrect (false negative) in some people with COVID-19. You might test negative if the sample was collected early during your infection. You could also be exposed to COVID-19 after your sample was collected and then have become infected.

This means that you could possibly still have COVID-9 even though the test result is negative. If your term is negative, your healthcare provider will consider the test result together with all other aspects of your medic history (such as symptoms, possible exporters, and geographical location of places you have recent traveled) in deciding how to care for you.

Laboratories may use pooling ween to ang your specimen, which means they control your so aple with other individuals samples protecting. If your test result indicates your pecime was pool and you have a negative test result there are mall chance that your result is incorrect. You should talk with your healthcare provider if you are concerned.

It is important that you work with your healthcare provider to help you understand the next steps you should take.

### Is this test FDA-approved or cleared?

No. This test is not yet approved or cleared by the United States FDA. FDA may issue an Emergency Use Authorization (EUA) when certain criteria are met, which includes that there are no adequate, approved, available alternatives.
