## SUBJECT: Request for Quote (RFQ\_FDA\_114048) for Neutering Services

This is a combined synopsis/solicitation for commercial services prepared in accordance with the format in FAR 12.6 as supplemented with FAR 13 and additional information included in this notice. The incorporated provisions and clauses are those in effect through Federal Acquisition Circular (FAC) 2022-06.

THIS ANNOUNCEMENT CONSTITUTES THE ONLY SOLICITATION AND A SEPARATE SOLICITATION WILL NOT BE ISSUED.

The solicitation number for this acquisition is RFQ\_FDA\_114048 and is being issued as a Request for Quote (RFQ). The NAICS Code for this solicitation: 115210, Support Activities for Animal Production and the Small Business Size Standard is \$7.5 million. The requirement will be awarded as Firm-Fixed Price. The Government reserves the right to award without discussions if the Contracting Officer determines that the initial offer is providing the Best Value and discussions are not necessary.

## Background:

The FDA Center for Veterinary Medicine is seeking the services of an American Animal Hospital Association (AAHA)-accredited, and State of Maryland licensed veterinary hospital to perform up to 27 canine neuter (male castration) surgeries. The neuter surgery is one of the "most common surgeries performed by veterinarians on cats and dogs" according to the American Veterinary Medical Association (https://www.avma.org/resources/pet-owners/petcare/spaying-and-neutering). The neuter surgeries are necessary to benefit the long-term health of the dogs and to help prepare them for adoption.

## 1) Statement of Work (SOW):

The contractor shall perform up to 27 canine neuter (male castration) surgeries as part of this contract. The individual body weights of all dogs are expected to be less than 30 pounds each at the time of presentation for surgery.

# Minimum salient characteristics:

The following requirements shall be met by the contractor:

- 1.1 The contractor, also termed the veterinary hospital, shall have the surgical facility, licensed veterinarian(s), trained veterinary support staff, and veterinary equipment necessary to perform up to 27 canine neuter (male castration) surgeries consistent with the veterinary Standard of Care required by the Maryland Veterinary Practice Act and related Code of Maryland regulations

- 1.2 The veterinarian performing the castration surgery or surgeries shall be currently licensed to practice veterinary medicine by the State of Maryland.
- 1.3 The veterinary hospital shall have full AAHA-accreditation.
- 1.4 The veterinary hospital shall be licensed by the State of Maryland with a physical address within the State of Maryland.
- 1.5 The canine castration surgeries shall be performed at the business location of the clinic, which shall match the physical address on the State of Maryland veterinary hospital license. FDA will cross reference physical address location on the Maryland registered business portal accessible at https://portal.mda.maryland.gov.
- 1.6 Due to the need to prevent prolonged transit times, the veterinary hospital shall be within 45 miles of FDA CVM's location; 8401 Muirkirk Rd, Laurel, MD 20708
- 1.7 The veterinary hospital shall maintain full AAHA-accreditation, and maintain full State of Maryland veterinary hospital licensure, during the entire time of service under this contract.
- 1.8 The veterinary hospital shall provide patient monitoring during the anesthetic event and recovery.
- The veterinary hospital shall contact the designated FDA CVM Contracting Officer Representative (COR) as soon as possible if there is an emergency or adverse changes to the patient's health. Pre-authorization by FDA CVM is required for the veterinary hospital to provide emergency and stabilization care, if required. The record of emergency veterinary care shall be included in the patient's veterinary record. If overnight monitoring is needed for the patient, and the veterinary hospital does not have staff monitor patients overnight, this shall be disclosed in the quote. The FDA CVM has the ability to transfer the care of a stable patient. FDA CVM will arrange for the care of stable patients once transported back to FDA CVM. The veterinary hospital will provide all patient records to FDA CVM or to another veterinary hospital as directed by FDA CVM. Patients that are not stable need to remain at the veterinary hospital until they are stable and can be safely transported to FDA CVM.
- 1.10 The veterinary hospital shall allow a site visit by FDA/CVM/OR employees, who may include, but are not limited to: Quality Assurance Unit members, the Attending Veterinarian, and members of the OR Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee. The purpose of the site visit is for FDA employees to verify that surgeries will be performed consistent with AAHA guidelines, and the veterinary Standard of Care required by the Maryland Veterinary Practice Act and related Code of Maryland regulations. This site visit is anticipated to be post-award of the contract and prior to surgeries.
- 1.11 FDA CVM will provide contractor with Complete Blood Count (CBC) and Blood Chemistry reports as pre-anesthetic and pre-operative bloodwork. These reports will be from within 15 days of the castration surgery. If the contractor requires internally generated results, the cost of this shall be included in their quote.



- 1.12 Paper or electronic copies of all veterinary records generated under this contact shall be made available for pickup from the clinic by a COR, or emailed to the designated COR, within 15 calendar days of completion of each surgical procedure.
- 1.13 The contractor shall maintain the confidentiality of the veterinary records of FDA CVM owned animals and shall not release the records to any party besides FDA CVM except as required by State of Maryland or U.S. federal law. The veterinary clinic can schedule the neuter surgeries in coordination with the designated FDA CVM COR for the mutual benefit of both parties. Surgeries shall be accomplished within the period of performance of the order. Currently, FDA CVM can accommodate up to 3 trips a day with a maximum of 2 dogs per trip. So the current maximum number of surgeries FDA/CVM can arrange transportation for is 6 dogs a day. FDA CVM is willing to work with the contractor to also schedule surgeries during the evenings or weekends upon mutual agreement of both parties. Scheduling a surgery on a federal holiday will only be upon express permission of the designated FDA CVM employee.
- 1.14 CVM/OR veterinarians will perform the post-operative check and suture removal once stable patients have returned to the facility. However, the clinic should include in quote if some or all dogs who receive neuter surgery be represented again to the clinic for the post-operative check and suture removal. The time of representation for a healthy patient shall be mutually agreed upon by FDA/CVM and the clinic. If any issues arise during the post-operative period, such as infection or suture failure, CVM will communicate this to the contractor if additional services are required.

## 2) Other Requirements:

- 2.1 The physical address of the veterinary clinic must be within the State of Maryland and within 45 miles of Laurel, Maryland. The distance requirement is necessary to prevent prolonged transit times.
- 2.2 The contractor and their employees shall not take photographs, images, or digital images of FDA CVM owned animals, and shall not post information or images of FDA CVM owned animals on publicly available media.

# 3) <u>Period of Performance:</u>

The neutering services shall be completed within 30 to 900 days of order.

## 4) <u>Inspection and Acceptance:</u>

4.1 The veterinary records generated under this contact shall be evaluated by the FDA CVM Attending Veterinarian and/or the FDA CVM Clinical Veterinarian to verify that the



neuter surgery completed. The record verification will be performed as records are provided to FDA CVM.

b. In addition to the days designated as holidays, the Government observes the following days:

- c. When any such day falls on a Saturday, the following Monday is observed. Except for designated around-the-clock or emergency operations, Contractor personnel will not be able to perform on-site under this contract with FDA on holidays set forth above. The Contractor shall not charge any holiday as direct charge to the award.
- d. It is understood and agreed between the Government and the Contractor that observance of such days by Government personnel shall not otherwise be a reason for an additional period of performance, or entitlement of compensation except as set forth within the award.
- e. Nothing in this clause abrogates the rights and responsibilities of the parties relating to stop work provisions as cited in other sections of this contract.

## B. FDA Invoicing Procedures:

- 1. 352.232-71 Electronic Submission of Payment Requests (FEB 2022)
- (a) Definitions. As used in this clause—

Payment request means a bill, voucher, invoice, or request for contract financing payment with associated supporting documentation. The payment request must comply with the requirements identified in FAR 32.905(b), "Content of Invoices" and the applicable Payment clause included in this contract.



- (b) Except as provided in paragraph (c) of this clause, the Contractor shall submit payment requests electronically using the Department of Treasury Invoice Processing Platform (IPP) or successor system. Information regarding IPP, including IPP Customer Support contact information, is available at www.ipp.gov or any successor site.
- (c) The Contractor may submit payment requests using other than IPP only when the Contracting Officer authorizes alternate procedures in writing in accordance with HHS procedures.
- (d) If alternate payment procedures are authorized, the Contractor shall include a copy of the Contracting Officer's written authorization with each payment request.
  - 2. FDA Electronic Invoicing and Payment Requirements Invoice Processing Platform (IPP) (Jan 2022)
  - a. All Invoice submissions for goods and or services must be made electronically through the U.S. Department of Treasury's Invoice Processing Platform System (IPP). http://www.ipp.gov/vendors/index.htm
  - b. Invoice Submission for Payment means any request for contract financing payment or invoice payment by the Contractor. To constitute a proper invoice, the payment request must comply with the requirements identified in in FAR 32.905(b), "Content of Invoices" and the applicable Payment clause included in this contract, or the clause 52.212-4 Contract Terms and Conditions Commercial Items included in commercial items contracts.   - c. (1) The Agency will enroll the Contractors new to IPP. The Contractor must follow the IPP registration email instructions for enrollment to register the Collector Account for submitting invoice requests for payment. The Contractor Government Business Point of Contact (as listed in SAM) will receive Registration email from the Federal Reserve Bank of St. Louis (FRBSTL) within 3 5 business days of the contract award for new contracts or date of modification for existing contracts.
    - (2) Registration emails are sent via email from ipp.noreply@mail.eroc.twai.gov. Contractor assistance with enrollment can be obtained by contacting the IPP Production Helpdesk via email to IPPCustomerSupport@fiscal.treasury.gov or phone (866) 973-3131.
    - (3) The Contractor POC will receive two emails from **IPP Customer Support**, the first email contains the initial administrative IPP User ID. The second email, sent within 24 hours of receipt of the first email, contains a temporary password. You must log in with the temporary password within 30 days.
    - (4) If your company is already registered to use IPP, you will not be required to reregister.
    - (5) If the Contractor is unable to comply with the requirement to use IPP for submitting invoices for payment as authorized by HHSAR 332.7002, a written request must be submitted to the Contracting Officer to explain the circumstances that require the authorization of alternate payment procedures.



- d. Invoices that include time and materials or labor hours Line Items must include supporting documentation to (1) substantiate the number of labor hours invoiced for each labor category, and (2) substantiate material costs incurred (when applicable).
- e. Invoices that include cost-reimbursement Line Items must be submitted in a format showing expenditures for that month, as well as contract cumulative amounts.

At a minimum the following cost information shall be included, in addition to supporting documentation to substantiate costs incurred.

- Direct Labor include all persons, listing the person's name, title, number of hours worked, hourly rate, the total cost per person and a total amount for this category;
- Indirect Costs (i.e., Fringe Benefits, Overhead, General and Administrative, Other Indirects)- show rate, base and total amount;
- Consultants (if applicable) include the name, number of days or hours worked, daily or hourly rate, and a total amount per consultant;
- Travel include for each airplane or train trip taken the name of the traveler, date of travel, destination, the transportation costs including ground transportation shown separately and the per diem costs. Other travel costs shall also be listed;
- Subcontractors (if applicable) include, for each subcontractor, the same data as required for the prime Contractor;
- Other Direct Costs include a listing of all other direct charges to the contract, i.e., office supplies, telephone, duplication, postage; and
- Fee amount as allowable in accordance with the Schedule and FAR 52.216-8 if applicable.
- f. Contractor is required to attach an invoice log addendum to each invoice which shall include, at a minimum, the following information for contract administration and reconciliation purposes:
  - (a) list of all invoices submitted to date under the subject award, including the following:
    - (1) invoice number, amount, & date submitted
    - (2) corresponding payment amount & date received
  - (b) total amount of all payments received to date under the subject contract or order
  - (c) and, for definitized contracts or orders only, total estimated amounts yet to be invoiced for the current, active period of performance.
- g. Payment of invoices will be made based upon acceptance by the Government of the entire task or the tangible product deliverable(s) invoiced. Payments shall be based on the Government certifying that satisfactory services were provided, and the Contractor has certified that labor charges are accurate.



- h. If the services are rejected for failure to conform to the technical requirements of the task order, or any other contractually legitimate reason, the Contractor shall not be paid, or shall be paid an amount negotiated by the CO.
- i. Payment to the Contractor will not be made for temporary work stoppage due to circumstances beyond the control of U.S. Food and Drug Administration such as acts of God, inclement weather, power outages, and results thereof, or temporary closings of facilities at which Contractor personnel are performing. This may, however, be justification for excusable delays.
- j. The Contractor agrees that the submission of an invoice to the Government for payment is a certification that the services for which the Government is being billed, have been delivered in accordance with the hours shown on the invoices, and the services are of the quality required for timely and successful completion of the effort.
- k. (A) If the service is related to item maintenance: A description of all covered telecommunications services offered (include on the item being maintained: Brand; model number, such as OEM number, manufacturer part number, or wholesaler number; and item description, as applicable); or



- (B) If not associated with maintenance, the Product Service Code (PSC) of the service being provided; and explanation of the proposed use of covered telecommunications services and any factors relevant to determining if such use would be permissible under the prohibition in paragraph (b)(1) of this provision.
- (2) Disclosure for the representation in paragraph (d)(2) of this provision. If the Offeror has responded "does" in the representation in paragraph (d)(2) of this provision, the Offeror shall provide the following information as part of the offer:

## (i) For covered equipment—

- (A) The entity that produced the covered telecommunications equipment (include entity name, unique entity identifier, CAGE code, and whether the entity was the OEM or a distributor, if known);
- (B) A description of all covered telecommunications equipment offered (include brand; model number, such as OEM number, manufacturer part number, or wholesaler number; and item description, as applicable); and
- (C) Explanation of the proposed use of covered telecommunications equipment and any factors relevant to determining if such use would be permissible under the prohibition in paragraph (b)(2) of this provision.

#### (ii) For covered services—

- (A) If the service is related to item maintenance: A description of all covered telecommunications services offered (include on the item being maintained: Brand; model number, such as OEM number, manufacturer part number, or wholesaler number; and item description, as applicable); or
- (B) If not associated with maintenance, the PSC of the service being provided; and explanation of the proposed use of covered telecommunications services and any factors relevant to determining if such use would be permissible under the prohibition in paragraph (b)(2) of this provision.
