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
POPULATION

Spokane County is located along the central portion of the eastern edge of Washington state. Spokane County was the fourth most populous county in the state in 2014 with 484,500 individuals¹. This accounts for 7.0% of the state's population. The city of Spokane was the second most populous incorporated city in the state with 212,300 individuals. The city of Spokane accounts for 43.8% of the county population with another 27.3% living in other incorporated municipalities and 28.9% living in unincorporated areas in Spokane County. Spokane County has the eighth highest population density in the state (out of 39 counties) with a density of 275 individuals per square mile.

In 2014, seniors made up the smallest proportion of the population. Spokane County had similar proportions by age group to the statewide proportions. Over the last decade, the proportion of the population younger than 18 years of age decreased approximately 2%. The proportion of the population aged 65 years or older increased approximately 2%.

Among county residents in 2013, 89.6% were white, 3.8% were of two or more races, 2.4% Asian, 2.2% black, 1.0% American Indian/ Alaska Native, 0.4% Native Hawaiian and other Pacific Islander. Statewide, the population is somewhat more racially diverse. Residents of Hispanic ethnicity comprised 5.0% of the Spokane County population (24,129) and 11.9% of the statewide population. Hispanics are included in all race categories in the following table.







High School Completion in Spokane County

Among students who began ninth grade, 81.6% graduated from high school on time during the 2013/2014 school year. Another 8.2% of this class continued in high school beyond the traditional graduation date and completed high school in the extended time period. Statewide, 77.2% of students graduated on time. Spokane County had a small increase in on time graduation from high school, while the proportion statewide was stable. EMPLOYMENT

There were 227,746 individuals 16 years of age or older who were in the labor force in Spokane County in 2013. Of those 16 years of age or older, 8.0% were unemployed, 1% were in the Armed Forces, and the remaining 91.3% were in the civilian labor force. Statewide, the workforce employment was similar; 7.8% unemployed, 1.4% in the Armed Forces, and 90.8% in the civilian labor force. Unemployed individuals are defined as individuals who used an active method of looking for work in the last four weeks, and do not include those who are retired, disabled, or students.

Among the civilian labor force, more than three-quarters were private wage and salary workers (78.0%). Government workers accounted for 15.7% of the labor force and 6.0% were self-employed.

INCOME AND POVERTY

Estimates of median household income are based on 2000 Census data, and on the Census Bureau's American Community Surveys' estimates for 2006-2010. These model-based estimates may differ from other median household income data developed from the Office of Financial Management's State Population Survey, Bureau of the Census estimates, or other sources. Survey data, which are subject to sampling variability and errors, are not necessarily more accurate than the estimate data.

Estimates of median household money income for the interand post-Census years are based on the Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) personal income data and the estimates of household characteristics, at the county level. For 2006-2011: The median household income estimates are anchored upon ACS estimates wherever available.


The projected median household income in Spokane County for 2014 was \$50,228 compared to \$58,686 statewide. The projected 2014 median household income is the highest in the last decade. In 2013, approximately one in six individuals (17.1%) in the county lived below 100% Federal Poverty Level (FPL) and 36.6% lived below 200% FPL. The proportion of Spokane County residents living in poverty (below 200% FPL) was significantly higher than the statewide proportion (31.1%).



COST OF BASIC NEEDS

The SRHD publication Facing Spokane Poverty (2002) details an approach to measuring poverty by examining the cost of basic needs in our community. Because poverty remains a concern in our community, SRHD updated the cost of basic needs information. The same methodology and sources of information were used as those detailed in Facing Spokane Poverty (2002). The cost of basic needs is based on a family of four consisting of two parents between 20 to 50 years of age and two children, one, four to five years of age, and one, six to eight years of age. The total basic needs costs equate to 180% FPL for a household of four in 2013.

Food costs are estimated by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and are available by age group and four food plans (www.cnpp.usda.gov). This analysis used the low-cost food plan as a sustainable measure of basic food needs and assumed that all meals and snacks were purchased at a store and prepared at home. Food costs for a family of four in December 2014 were \$869.77 per month.

Utility costs were a combination of energy and telephone services. Telephone service was based on the basic plan with no additional amenities. According to CenturyLink, a plan with basic telephone service in Spokane for 2014 starts at \$35.00 per month. Energy costs were updated using a cost of living calculator from the American Institute for Economic Research (www.aier.org). Energy costs increased to \$118, reflecting cost-of-living increases.

Housing cost was based on a two-bedroom apartment in Spokane County. According to Spokane/Kootenai Real Estate Research Committee, Spokane County Apartment Market, the average rent rate for a two-bedroom apartment in Spokane County was \$702 in 2013.

Transportation costs were based on a family having one older car and using public transportation. An assump—tion was made that there was no car payment. Only one child bus pass was accounted for since children six years and younger ride free. The cost of gas was calculated for driving 20 miles per day at 20 miles per gallon at \$3.74 per gallon for gasoline in June 2014*. The cost for insurance was based on only having liability coverage for a 1994 car. A minimal amount of maintenance was also allotted.

Childcare cost was reported by ChildCare Aware of Washington Family Center. The information reported for Spokane County for child care cost identifies two children (one pre-school child 2 ½ to 5 years of age and one school age child >6 years of age), in a family of four. The cost for childcare refers to the average rates for a network center.

Health insurance was evaluated and calculated expecting a family of four (two adults, two children) to live below 200% of FPL in 2014 with no health insurance offered by their employer.*

Personal and household expenses were calculated as 10% of the cost per month for basic needs for a family of four in Spokane County.

^{*} Washington State Department of Social and Health Services (DSHS) provides health and dental insurance through the Apple Health program. Eligibility for Apple coverage is based on income as compared the Federal Poverty Level (FPL). Options for Apple Health coverage in Spokane County for a family of four living at 165% FPL were identified using the health insurance exchange at www.wahealthplanfinder.org. Monthly premiums varied depending on coverage options. Expenses for basic needs for health care were calculated using a monthly premium for a family plan with a low deductible and low co-pay, two outpatient visits per person with an estimated co-pay of \$5, two prescrip-tions per person with an estimated co-pay of \$5, and meeting the annual deductible for the family of \$500.

HOUSING

In 2013, there were an estimated 204,343 housing units in Spokane County. Of those, 8.8% were vacant. The majority of occupied housing was owner-occupied (61.9%), while the remaining housing units (38.1%) were renter-occupied. Most occupied housing had complete plumbing and kitchen facilities; 0.2% lacked plumbing and 0.9% lacked kitchen facilities.

Approximately 16% of housing units were built in 2000 or later. A similar percentage of housing units were built in 1939 or earlier. Spokane County has a higher proportion of older housing compared to statewide that has a higher proportion of newer houses.


City of Spokane Community, Housing and Human Services reported that the 2014 one-day count of homeless individuals in Spokane County identified 1,149 individuals, which is a decrease from 2012. Of those counted, 39% were individuals in families with children.





Childcare Subsidy: In 2013, there were 10,936 individuals in Spokane County who received subsidy payments for Washington State Department of Social and Health Services' Working Connections Child Care program. This program provides childcare assistance to eligible families who require childcare to participate in approved Washington State WorkFirst activities, maintaining employment, or attending trainings. A total of \$15,643,267 was spent on this program; \$1,430 per recipient.
